USGA RULES GOVERN ALL PLAY EXCEPT WHERE MODIFIED BY LOCAL RULES

- Water Hazards are defined by yellow stakes or lines.
Lateral Water Hazards are defined by red stakes or lines.
Out-of-Bounds is defined by white stakes, roadways and boundary fences.
 - A player whose ball is lost or hit into the native grass areas may, with penalty of one stroke, drop a ball within two club lengths (no closer to the hole) of the point of entry.
 - Yardage markers are measured to the center of the green.
 - Keep golf carts on paths around tees, greens and bunkers, and out of the native grass areas. Use 90° rule when possible.
 - Please repair all marks on greens, rake bunkers and fill divots with sand mixture.

The Legacy Golf Club, rich in heritage and history, is an 18-hole par 71 championship golf course designed by renowned golf course architect Gary Panks. Located on what was once Dwight B.
